Open House slated March 12

NORTHUMBERLAND — The public is invited to Priestley House, Northumberland, to help celebrate Joseph Priestley's 283rd birthday on Sunday, March 12.

Admission will be free between 1 and 4 p.m. Birthday cake and punch will be served in the Visitors Center.

Joseph Priestley was born in England on March 13, 1733. The renowned scientist, political thinker and clergyman came to Northumberland in 1794 and lived there until he died in Priestley House in 1804

Ronald Blatchley, retired chemistry teacher who portrays Dr. Priestley, will perform chemistry demonstrations in the Pond Building on the grounds at 1:30 and 2:30 p.m.

Visitors may tour the museum at their own pace, with guides in period costume to greet them and answer questions.

The Friends of the Joseph Priestley House operates the museum, which is owned by the Pennsylvania Historic and Museum Commission. The open house will also be part of a statewide commemoration by the commission to mark the signing of the state's charter. Priestley House will then be open for the season from 1 to 4 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday (except Easter Sunday and Mother's Day) from March 12 until Nov. 19. LEWISBURG — The Susquehanna Valley Chorale (SVC) will present Voices of Light, a work for chorale and orchestra featuring the 1928 silent film, The Passion of Joan of Arc, on Saturday,



of Joan of Arc, rejected most of the script that the studio commissioned and used excerpts from the trial transcripts. The film is set entirely at Joan's trials and burning, compressing the

March 11, at 7:30 p.m., and Sunday, March 12, at 2 p.m., at the Campus Theatre, 413 Market St., Lewisburg. Parental guidance is suggested.

The performance will feature four local soloists: Emily Martin, soprano; Dianna Grabowski, alto; Stephen Ng, tenor, and Brian Mextorf, baritone.

According to composer Richard Einhorn, Voices of Light explores the patchwork of emotions and thoughts that are stitched together into the notion of a female hero. Joan of Arc was deeply religious, utterly chaste, and astonishingly brave in the face of horrific abuse. In 1920 nearly 500 years after her death, Joan was declared a saint.

Voices of Light uses a libretto that is a montage of ancient writings assembled primarily from female medieval mystics, including Joan of Arc. The music is scored

action from seven months to a single day. Joan's 'character" is sung neither in a soprano or alto range, but in both simultaneously, with simple harmony and in rhythmic unison.

Voices of Light was performed by the Acadia Players to sold-out audiences at the Academy of Music in Northampton, Mass., in February 1994. Since then, it has been featured at the Brooklyn Academy of Music New Wave Festival and recorded by Anonymous 4 and the Radio Netherlands Philharmonic and Choir.

SVC Conductor and Music Director Bill Payn says, "Both the music and imagery are haunting, powerful and poignant."
